- Common knowledge exception/Res Ipsa Loquitur
 - So obviously substandard medical expertise not necessary. *Methodist Hospital v. Johnson, supra.*
 - Shifting of burden of proof *Cox v. Paul,* 828 N.E.2d 907 (Ind. 2005)
 Retained sponge *Ho v. Frye,* 880 N.E.2d 1192 (Ind. 2008)
